

Electronic Art Format & Design Guidelines

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MOST PREFERRED FORMAT

Adobe Illustrator (newest ver. if possible)

Best for design layout, primarily vector art

*The preferred program for printing. Text is clear and crisp. No loss in quality when scaled.
(Please convert fonts to outlines).

1. Save Adobe Illustrator files with ***ALL FONTS OUTLINED.**
2. Save as an AI or EPS file.
3. Save with all images embedded (CMYK).
4. Document raster effects settings should be 300.
5. Supply all files needed (Fonts, EPS's, TIFFS).
6. **INCLUDE A PDF TO PROOF ARTWORK:**
Export as Hi-Res or PDF Preset: Press Quality

Adobe Indesign (newest ver. if possible)

Design layout, desktop publishing

*Converts to Illustrator easily but has issues when outlining fonts – may change appearance.

1. Save as an INDESIGN or EPS file.
2. **DO NOT OUTLINE FONTS**, but you must supply us with all fonts and links used.
3. **INCLUDE A PDF TO PROOF ARTWORK:**
Export as Hi-Res or PDF Preset: Press Quality

Photoshop (any version) –

Best for raster images

*Please Note; Do not set type in Photoshop. It will appear fuzzy when printed.

1. Keep as a layered document – do not flatten.
2. Ensure files are at least 300dpi and not scaled up.
3. Save as a CMYK Photoshop file or EPS.

Please include PDF with either of the above so we can use to proof against or use as art if necessary.

PDF - Please use if none of the above apps are available.

*Most apps have an "export to PDF" option.
*Converts to Illustrator or Photoshop easily.

1. Export as Hi-Res or PDF Preset: Press Quality
2. Ensure any embedded images are at least **300dpi & CMYK.**
3. If possible, Outline / Convert to paths ALL FONTS.
4. Remove / turn off security options (if applicable).

NOTE: If you are using Affinity, Canva, or other similar software, you **MUST** export it as a PDF per the PDF instructions above.

NOTE:

The above listed files are the **ONLY** files we accept. If you are not able to export or save your document as a PDF, you may use a Free File Converter Service such as Zamzar (www.zamzar.com). Be sure to check your file after conversion that it is intact.

Electronic Art Format & Design Guidelines

Copy Considerations:

- Make type sizes no smaller than 4 pts. in positives.
- Make type sizes no smaller than 5 pts. in reverses.
- Make line weights no thinner than .35 pts. in positives.
- Make line weights no thinner than .75 pts. in reverses.
- Provide all fonts used or outline all fonts.
- Drop shadows without a keyline can cause registration problems.
- **Keep Bleeds & Art .125" away from cut line or fold line.**

Color Considerations:

- Screens and solids do not always run together (When ran together, the solid color could be 1-2 shades lighter in order to keep the screens clean. Example: 4/color process has a Screen Black and Solid Black type.
- Bitmap/rasterized graphics should be **300dpi**, saved as EPS and scaled in Photoshop.
- Consider using a single spot color when possible and stay away from knock-outs in multiple colors (i.e. Process). A 1pt keyline of solid black or any other dark solid spot color used in the design will ensure quality reproduction.
- Allow the design to accept at least .5pt of trap.

CHOOSING OR REFERENCING COLOR:

Please refer to the **Pantone Color Guide**.

These color guides are the standard used throughout the printing industry.

You should refer to a "Physical" Color Guide, and not via an online representation.

Choose the correct Guide that will correspond to the paper stock upon which the ink will be printed.

For example, if you choose an uncoated stock (ie., 14 pt. uncoated cover), then refer to a Pantone Uncoated Color Guide.

A Paper Company, such a Kirk or Kelly, may allow you to use their Guide.

A Spot Color Pantone Guide may be used to adhere to brand identity.

There are a variety of guides available – Metallics, Fluorescent/Neon, Pastels, etc.

As most jobs today are printed CMYK and on coated stock, the most common reference guide is the **Pantone CMYK Coated** and **Pantone CMYK Uncoated** Color Guides.

Also, be sure you are in a well lit area when viewing colors. Natural sunlight is ideal.

There is a **Lighting Indicator** at the back of the booklet that can be used as an indicator that you are viewing the booklet in ambient D50 lighting conditions.
